


Uncertainty and the emergence of racism in the migrant crisis

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
Large, complex issues in the global environment contribute to general political destabilisation and social unrest on the local level. These augment the influence of all other available chaotic attractors which, in return, also feed back to destabilisation and unrest.

Political affiliations in the ongoing conflicts and the heavy insistence on political correctness also prevent open, non-discriminative but critical discussion about contested key topics, e.g. religious and political radicalism in the Middle East, authoritarian rule etc. This creates an openings for radical far right ideologies – and often free publicity.

The immigrant crisis functions as such a destabilizing factor. The present instability poses a challenge for democratic political systems to (a) either develop new metastable structures that can accommodate the demands of the changing demographic makeup while keeping its inclusive outlook, or (b) to collapse to more stable but less democratic participation and decision-making structures.

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
