1) Pre-call for papers DRL-XIV 2024


We would to pre-announce the call for papers for our annual conference on Russian law, that we plan to take place in November 2024 in Helsinki. We continue our work and are committed to further study Russian law in comparative and global contexts. The topic for the conference is **Law in the Times of War: Conflicts, Legal Responses and Legal Solutions.** We would like to focus on comparative approaches to law in conflict situations and discuss possible strategies and solutions to war-time legislation across the Globe. 2) 1013 Individuals Detained on Political Grounds, Data Survey, OVD-Info Advocacy and 21 Months of Full-scale War

Dear friends,

This is the latest update from the OVD-Info data department.

As of today in Russia and annexed Crimea, 3,442 individuals face criminal persecution on political grounds, with 1,013 currently deprived of their freedom. These statistics are derived from the Database of Politically Motivated Criminal Prosecutions, recently published by the OVD-Info team. The dataset focuses on criminal cases initiated by Russian investigative bodies (Ministry of Internal Affairs, Investigative Committee, Federal Security Service) and adjudicated by Russian courts — cases we identify as politically motivated. This format marks its inaugural release.

Continuous monitoring of politically motivated cases and updating the database with information on individuals persecuted in such cases is ongoing. The data visualization is updated every Monday.

Twenty-one months ago, Russia initiated a full-scale war against Ukraine. Following anti-war protests in the early days of the invasion, an unprecedented wave of repression unfolded within Russia. In the November update, you will find detailed information on administrative and criminal cases against individuals with anti-war views, as well as extrajudicial pressure and internet censorship.



We extend our gratitude to all who participated in our first two seminars in the series "Political Repression in Russia: 2012-2023: Data, Actors, and Practices", organized by OVD-Info in collaboration with the French project L'Archipel and researchers from the School for Advanced Studies in the Social Sciences (EHESS), Sciences Po, and Paris-Nanterre University. The third seminar will take place on 21 December at 16:30 CET (please note: earlier communication mentioned 15 December; this date is now rescheduled to 21 December). This session will focus on gathering data on anti-war persecutions and how the repressions and working with them changed after February 24th.

3) "International LGBT social movement" declared extremist organization by the Russian Supreme Court

On November 30th the Supreme Court of the Russian Federation <u>has declared</u> the "International LGBT social movement" extremist organization in a closed trial. The proceedings were initiated by the Russian Ministry of Justice. In its <u>claim</u> the Ministry stated that the "movement" is inciting to social and religious hatred. Russian human rights defenders undertook attempts to influence the outcome of the case: several organizations presented <u>a</u> <u>joint legal opinion</u> on the illegitimacy of the claim pointing out that the defendant is formally non-existent, lacks legal personality, and constitutes a whole social group based on sexuality and gender identity. Another group of activists <u>created</u> the "International LGBT social movement" and unsuccessfully tried to intervene in the case.

The experts are convinced that LGBTQ+ people may face administrative sanctions and criminal prosecution just being open about their sexuality and/or gender identity. People who express solidarity with LGBTQ+ community are also under the threat. The extremist status of the "movement" will also affect the organizations of civil society that provide help to representatives of vulnerable groups. More information in Russian language about the consequences of the Supreme Court's judgment including risks related to the use of "extremist symbols" which refers to the pride flag in this case, can be found in materials published by Meduza. The lawyers claim that the implementation of the new regulations is unpredictable and may affect a wide range of people. They refer to an analogous situation with the A. U. E. movement (abbreviation for Arestantskoe Ugolovnoe Edinstvo translated as prisoners' criminal unity, an informal Russian criminal and prison subculture) and point out that courts' jurisprudence on this matter includes among other things criminal prosecution for private conversations.

This is a second major Russian anti-LGBTQ+ campaign in 2023: in July, the Russian parliament adopted a federal law prohibiting gender transition.

4) The 2nd Congress of Civic, Anti-War and Humanitarian Initiatives and Their Partners was held in Brussels

CONGRESS

OF CIVIL, ANTI-WAR, HUMANITARIAN, INITIATIVES AND THEIR PARTNERS BRUSSELS, November 27, 2023

The Congress united more than a hundred horizontal grassroots anti-war, civil, humanitarian, human rights, and media initiatives operating both in exile and in Russia. The main fields of participants' work include:

- searching for Ukrainian children and civic hostages abducted to Russian territory and providing anti-war and humanitarian work on the occupied territories;
- working with refugees from Ukraine and political migrants from Russia, helping them adapt to their new location;
- providing legal, psychological, informational, infrastructural support for politically persecuted activists in Russia helping them to leave the country and to adapt to the new life abroad;
- combating propaganda;
- protecting the rights of vulnerable groups during the war, including LGBTQ+ people, women*,
 and people of color;
- cooperating with the EU-member states institutions.

The Congress was organized with the support from the European Union and the German Ministry of Foreign affairs. The representatives of international governmental and non-governmental organizations (European Commission, European External Action Service, European Parliament, FIDH, European Prison Litigation Network, etc.), academia (Stockholm Institute of Eastern European Studies (SCEEUS), Copenhagen University, Scuola Normale Superiore and Public Sociology Laboratory, etc.), as well as of Ukrainian civil society (Nonviolence International-Ukraine, Center for Civil Liberties) and governmental officials from European states were engaged in the polylogue with the Russian opposition.

The discussions were dedicated to 8 topics:

- How can Russian civil society support Ukraine?
- Cooperation between the EU and the Russian democratic forces: do we need a united opposition? Human rights in the uncharted territory.

- Strategy of resistance in Russia: transformation and democratization.
- Bringing abducted Ukrainian children, refugees and prisoners of war from Russia back to Ukraine: how to return them home and achieve justice?
- What else is possible inside the Russian Federation and how to support activists?
- Russian political transition in the EU one and a half years of help in rescuing politically persecuted activists in Russia: what have been done and what can be done to improve the transit process for future new arrivals?
- Supporting the sustainable impact of Russian anti-war initiatives: opportunities and priorities.

During the discussions, the participants formulated the aims and collectively elaborated concrete future steps to achieve them. The contributors agreed that subsequent action plan includes:

- Protection of the rights of trans political prisoners.
- Engagement in civic education about human rights in Russia.
- Support of the development of a democratic civil society within Russia.
- Opposing propaganda in Russia.
- Creation of an information campaign for European partners about what is really happening in Russia.
- Launching an information campaign on the Russian presidential election as a tool for anti-war activities
- Working on developing decolonial optics for the future tax system in Russia
- Development of instructions on how to work with international and independent journalists for anti-war activists.
- Support of political prisoners in Russia.
- Strengthening of the interaction between representatives of Ukrainian and Russian civil societies.
- Creation of a resource and fundraising support center for Russian anti-war and democratic initiatives.
- Preparation of information platforms on the needs of the LGBTQ+ community and civil society actors within Russia.
- Organization of a public campaign against the abortion ban in Russia.
- Creation of a communication platform for emergency evacuation of LGBTQ+ activists.
- Organization of a major anti-war campaign for the presidential elections in European cities.
- Coordination and organization of a major anti-war action to mark the two-year anniversary of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine.
- Improvement of the interaction between Russian democratic anti-war diasporas.
- Establishment of a joint Russian-Ukrainian advocacy group to support Ukraine.

2) Call for Papers for the SQS journal's Special Issue on Queering Crises

Environmental disasters, armed conflicts, and pandemics causing health risks have multiplied globally in recent decades. In sociological disaster studies, catastrophes and the impacts of crises are examined through the lens of social, political, and economic inequalities. It is known that crises affect populations in different ways based on social class, gender, or the expression of sexuality and related norms, as well as factors such as age or disability. This special issue of the SQS Journal, titled "Queering Crises," aims to make visible the contribution of queer studies to the field of crisis research and simultaneously encourages queer researchers to contemplate the impact of crises on situations within the LGBTQIA+ community.

The special issue welcomes article proposals that approach the topic from perspectives such as refugee crises, pandemics, environmental disasters (e.g., floods and climate change), armed conflicts and wars, or more broadly, the viewpoint of polycrises (accumulation and intertwining of multiple crises). On one hand, environmental disasters and climate change are known to disproportionately affect marginalized populations in the global south. Global interconnectedness and interdependence, on the other hand, mean that in the future, crises will increasingly affect populations in the global north, as demonstrated by events such as the COVID-19 pandemic or Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Polycrises impact socio-ecological and economic systems and multiple locations simultaneously. Articles may focus on issues such as inequality and discrimination, participation, political activism, rights and justice, or queer spaces emerging in times of crisis.

We invite submissions for this special issue, ranging from research articles to various types of other texts such as essays, discussions, lectures, and book reviews. We welcome article proposals from disciplines such as history, geography, social sciences (including political science, sociology, social work, global development studies, peace and conflict studies, international politics), law (including international law), language, communication and cultural studies, medicine and health sciences, and education.

For articles, we request abstracts (max. 300 words), and for other texts, brief descriptions of ideas (max. 100 words) by email no later than February 5, 2024. Completed texts should be submitted to the editors by June 7, 2024.

The positions are fixed-term and will end 31.12.2024. The work will begin as soon as possible by mutual agreement.

The project addresses the political and legal framework for recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic. The multidisciplinary project involves more than 20 researchers from the University of Turku, the University of Helsinki, and Tampere University. The work is part of a research group at the Faculty of Law of the University of Turku which conducts research on fundamental rights, law and jurisdiction, and crisis regulation in the pandemic era. The research is funded by the Strategic Research Council (SRC) established within the Research Council of Finland.

Salary and trial period

The salary is determined in accordance with the university salary system for teaching and research personnel and will depend on the degree and qualifications of the applicant. The salary of a Postdoctoral Researcher is 3400-3600 euros/month on average depending on competence and experience, and the salary of a Project Researcher is approximately 2400–2600 euros/month. The position has a trial period of three (3) months.

The OSUN Center for Human Rights & the Arts invites applications for a one-year research and teaching fellowship in human rights and the arts. The position is open to individuals working in a variety of fields where human rights and the arts intersect, including artists, curators, researchers, scholars, writers, filmmakers, advocates and activists. The fellowship covers a period of one year, i.e. two academic semesters, from July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025, and includes compensation of \$65,000. Please note that the Fellow is expected to be in residence at the College during the teaching semesters. The Fellow will pursue their own research or creative practice within the interdisciplinary and critical framework of the Center, and contribute to the curriculum of the Center's M.A. Program in Human Rights and the Arts by teaching one course each semester. The M.A. program, which launched in the 2021-22 academic year, explores the encounter between human rights and the arts as fields of academic knowledge, professional work, and artistic practice, while also offering students opportunities to explore ways of confronting the conceptual and practical perplexities of that encounter.
